Loose and Lively Acrylics Perry Haddock

Supply List:

Bring whatever acrylic paints and supplies you have: an easel will help, along with your paints and brushes, palette, water containers, paper towels, crackers and cheese, etc., and at least 2 canvasses or boards in the 11x14 to 16x20 range, and a couple of small (8x10 is good) ones for exercises.

Any brand of professional quality acrylics will do. Don't feel you need all of these, but...

My most common tubes are: (*italicized* ones are <u>transparent</u>, and are important for the glazing process, which is integral to my process.) *essential

Titanium white *Green gold *Indian yellow Yellow ochre Cadmium yellow light Cad yellow medium *Pthalo blue (red shade) Cerulean blue Pthalo Turquoise *Dioxazine violet *Transparent red iron oxide Quinacridone burnt orange (Golden brand) Quinacridone nickel azo gold Quinacridone magenta Hookers green Cadmium red light and

A <u>small</u> container of black gesso if you have it, any brand. Don't buy it if you don't already have it. You won't need much, and I can supply it.

At least one good wide brush. 1 ½-2" Opus sells an inexpensive but decent "gesso" brush with a blue handle. I use almost exclusively flat brushes, *designed for acrylics*. They form a good crisp edge when wet. Two of those should do: a ½" and a wider one—perhaps ¾" or 1" Simply Simmons is a good but inexpensive line. Opus doesn't carry it, but perhaps there's another local supplier.
